Purpose of the Board

The purpose of the Board is to review annually the programs of the National Fire Academy (NFA) and advise the Administrator of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), through the United States Fire Administrator, of the operation of the NFA and any improvements therein that the Board deems appropriate. In carrying out its responsibilities, the Board examines NFA programs to determine whether these programs further the basic missions that are approved by the Administrator of FEMA, examines the physical plant of the NFA to determine the adequacy of the NFA's facilities, and examines the funding levels for NFA programs. The Board submits a written annual report, through the United States Fire Administrator, to the Administrator of FEMA. The report provides detailed comments and recommendations regarding the operation of the NFA.

Agenda

At its December 2013 meeting, the Board recommended establishing a two-year NFA Managing Officer Program designed to enhance the management and leadership skills of first-line to mid-level managers in their fire and emergency medical service organizations. Two subcommittees were established by the Designated Federal Officer to

review curriculum and admissions and final project guidelines. The Board will review reports from these subcommittees, deliberate, and develop recommendations for presentation to the FEMA Administrator through the U.S. Fire Administrator.

SUBJ: Subcommittee Recommendations

DATE: March 28, 2014

The National Fire Academy (NFA) has chosen to start a new program titled Managing Officer Program (MOP). This program is aimed at improving the capabilities of mid-level officers. The NFA has asked the Board of Visitors to assist with the initial development of this program. Two subcommittees were formed to look at the admission requirements and curriculum needed to support this program.

The MOP Admissions Subcommittee was formed to discuss and recommend admissions requirements for the Managing Officer Program. The goals of this subcommittee included:

- Determining admission requirements, to include academic requirements (considering credit hours, life-experience, institutional accreditation, transfer hours, etc.), experience (as a supervising officer, etc.), certifications (FF, FO, etc.), and any other necessary requirements. Also determine if a “tiered” selection process is appropriate for admissions in this program.
- Determining requirements for a capstone project (after completion of core courses).

This subcommittee met through telephone conferences on February 27, 2014 and March 27, 2014. Admissions Subcommittee members and the organizations they represented included:

After two separate telephone conferences, this subcommittee wants to reinforce the idea that the candidates for the Managing Officer Program should have a strong background as supervising officers, supported by education, training, and experience. In particular, the following recommendations are provided with that thought in mind:

1. Education: The subcommittee is recommending that candidates should have earned an Associate degree (approximately 60+ credit hours) from an accredited institution (either regionally or nationally accredited). In addition, only 25% of those credit hours earned should be from non-traditional credits, and these non-traditional credits should come through a structured learning environment. The subcommittee recommends no credit should be included at this level for “life experiences”.
2. Training: The subcommittee is recommending that candidates should have a strong background in training provided at the local, regional and state level. Their training should have exposed them to more than just local requirements, such as regional and state training with responders from other jurisdictions.

While the subcommittee does not recommend particular levels of certification, there should be evidence of training that supports their role as a supervising officer (fire or EMS). This training can be demonstrated in one of many forms, which may include, but not be limited to the following:

- Certification at the Fire Officer I level (based on NFPA 1041).
- Credentialed at the Fire Officer designation through the Center for Public Safety Excellence (CPSE).
- Training at the fire or EMS leadership level.
- State/regional symposiums, conferences, and workshops supporting leadership, management, and supervision.
- Other training that supports the competencies identified in the IAFC Officer Handbook, 2nd Edition for the supervising officer (page 25-26).

The subcommittee also recommends the following prerequisite training as a requirement for admission to this program: IS-700, IS-800, ICS-100, ICS-200. These training programs are available both locally and on-line (through FEMA and the NFA).

3. Experience: The subcommittee is recommending that candidates have experience as a supervising officer (fire or EMS), which could include equivalent time as an “acting officer”. The fire/EMS chief should verify this experience through their signature on the NFA application. While the subcommittee does not recommend a separate letter from the fire/EMS chief, we do recommend a checklist be developed to assist the chief in ensuring all the requirements for admissions are complete.

The subcommittee does not recommend using a tiered selection process for admission to this program.

4. Capstone Project: The subcommittee recommends that the “capstone project” be an applied project that benefits the fire/EMS agency, or the community it serves. In particular, the candidates chief or immediate supervisor should help vet the project prior to final approval. The scope of the project should be appropriate to the candidates’ duties/responsibilities in their organization, and be appropriate to the Managing Officer Program. The subcommittee recommends that these projects may be based on one of the following, but not limited to:

- Lessons learned from one of the core courses required in the Managing Officer Program.
- Taken from the listed experiences of the managing officer as identified in the IAFC Officer Handbook, 2nd Edition (pages 33-34).
- Equivalent issue/problem identified by the candidates agency, or in the agency’s served area/jurisdiction.

The Admissions Subcommittee asks the National Fire Academy-Board of Visitors to review the submitted recommendations and make its final recommendations to the Federal Emergency Management Agency Administrator through the US Fire Administrator.

SUBJ: Subcommittee Recommendations

The National Fire Academy, with support from the Board of Visitors, is moving forward on the development of a Managing Officers Program (MOP) to provide professional development to managing officers in career, volunteer and combination Fire, EMS and Rescue organizations. The Board of Visitors created two subcommittees to provide input from various industry experts and Fire and EMS organization representatives.

The MOP Curriculum Subcommittee was created to determine the appropriate curriculum for the program. The goals of this committee were:

- To determine the appropriate four 6-day NFA On-Campus courses that should be part of the students 2 NFA visits.
- To determine the number of 2-day NFA Off-Campus offerings and make recommendations of which ones should be in the program.
- To determine the number of Online NFA offerings and make recommendations of which ones should be in the program.
- To make a recommendation on how to address those students who have already completed one of the Off-Campus or Online programs prior to entry into the MOP.
- To make recommendations if any of the Off-Campus or Online programs should be pre-requisite.

The Subcommittee communicated through email and had one conference call meeting on March 27, 2014 at 1300 hrs (EST). The Curriculum Subcommittee members and the organizations they represent included:

As a result of the input of these communications, the Subcommittee recommends the following curriculum for the NFA Managing Officer Program:

1. NFA On-Campus Courses
 - a. 21st Century Training for Fire/EMS Training Officers (R0354)
 - b. Conducting Local Risk Reduction for Company Officers (R0186)
 - c. Safety Program Operations (R0154)
 - d. Technology for Emergency Services (R0153)
2. NFA Off-Campus Courses
 - a. Leadership I for Fire and EMS (F0803)
 - b. Leadership II for Fire and EMS (F0804)
 - c. Leadership III for Fire and EMS (F0805)
 - d. Shaping the Future (F/W0602)
3. NFA Online Courses
 - a. Introduction to Emergency Response to Terrorism (Q890)
4. Further, the Curriculum Subcommittee recommended against any of the Off-Campus courses being pre-requisite due to the timeframe hindrances that may be caused by the variables of course offerings at the State or Regional level. Consistency with the NFA Executive Fire Officer Program was also discussed.
5. The Subcommittee also recommends that any candidate who has successfully completed the most recent revision of the Off-Campus or Online Coursework shall be permitted to use these courses toward completion of the MOP. Any coursework that is not the most recent revision should be re-taken.

The Curriculum Subcommittee respectfully requests the National Fire Academy-Board of Visitors to review the submitted recommendations and make its final recommendations to the Federal Emergency Management Agency Administrator through the U.S. Fire Administrator.
