
National Fire Department Registry Summary

Fire departments

The U.S. Fire Administration's National Fire Department Registry is a voluntary program, and it does not include all fire departments in the U.S. or its territories. As of January 2024, there were 27,166 registered fire departments, which constitute about 92% of the departments estimated to be in the U.S.¹

Fire departments by census region

Figure 1 shows that most registered departments are located in Southern (36%) and Midwestern (31%) regions of the U.S.² Less than 1% of the registered fire departments are in U.S. territories.

¹The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) estimated that there were 29,452 fire departments in the U.S. in 2020 — the latest available estimate at the time of this analysis.

²The regions of the U.S. are defined by the U.S. Census Bureau as the Northeast (Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont); South (Alabama, Arkansas, Delaware, District of Columbia, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, West Virginia); Midwest (Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota, Wisconsin); and West (Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah, Washington, Wyoming).

Fire departments by state

Stations

The registered departments represent 52,309 fire stations across the country.³ Of the registered departments:

- 67.8% have 1 station.
- 17.0% have 2 stations.
- 15.2% have 3 or more stations.

Organization type

The majority (96%) of registered departments are local fire departments that include career, combination and volunteer fire departments and fire districts. The remaining 4% comprise tribal, state and federal government fire departments; contract fire departments; private or industrial fire brigades; and transportation authority or airport fire departments.

³For counties in Georgia, Maryland, Nevada and Virginia, where it is known that both the county-level fire department registered and the individual fire departments associated with that county department also registered, the computation of the number of stations includes only the number of stations reported by the county-level department to avoid counting stations twice.

Personnel

The registered fire departments are staffed by 1,210,600 personnel.⁴ This figure includes career, volunteer and paid-per-call firefighters, as well as civilian staff and nonfirefighting personnel. There were a total of 1,058,800 active career, volunteer and paid-per-call firefighters representing 87% of the registered departments' personnel. Of the active firefighting personnel:

- **3**4.8% were career firefighters.
- **●** 52.6% were volunteer firefighters.
- 12.6% were paid-per-call firefighters.

Department type

Of the registered fire departments:5

- Career departments constitute 9.5%.
- Mostly career departments constitute 5.0%.
- Mostly volunteer departments constitute 15.5%.
- Volunteer departments constitute 70.0%.

Department type by state

Table 2 shows the percent of registered fire departments by department type within each state and the District of Columbia.

⁴There were 83 fire departments that did not provide the number of active firefighting personnel. These departments were excluded from this analysis. For counties in Georgia, Maryland, Nevada and Virginia, where it is known that both the county-level fire department registered and the individual fire departments associated with that county department also registered, the computation of the number of personnel includes only the personnel counts reported by the county-level department to avoid counting personnel twice. Numbers of personnel were rounded to the nearest 100.

⁵The department type is based on NFPA definitions. (Career: 100% of a department's firefighters are career. Mostly career: 51% to 99% of a department's firefighters are career. Wostly volunteer: 1% to 50% of a department's firefighters are career. Volunteer: 100% of a department's firefighters are volunteer.) The numbers of fire department personnel are used to determine the department type. There were 83 fire departments that did not provide the number of active firefighting personnel. These departments were excluded from this analysis.




Figures 2 and 3 show the top 25 states (excluding the District of Columbia and U.S. territories) ranked by percentage of volunteer and career fire departments, respectively.

Specialized services

Table 3 shows the percentage of registered fire departments that provide a specialized service. The leading specialized services provided include vehicle extrication (79%), fire/injury prevention and public education (65%), wildfire/wildland urban interface (WUI) (64%), and basic life support (BLS) services (61%). Only 5% of registered departments have fireboat service capabilities. Of the departments that provide fire investigation/fire-cause determination services, 20% have sworn investigators with power to arrest. In addition, about 71% of the nation's fire departments provide some level of emergency medical services (EMS).

Primary agency responsible for emergency management

Of the registered fire departments:

- 32% were the primary agency responsible for emergency management (EM) in their community.6
- 25% were not the primary agency responsible for EM in their community.
- 43% had blank values for this data element.

⁶EM is the integration and coordination of all-hazards mitigation, prevention, preparedness, response and recovery activities within a community for all (or most) agencies such as fire, EMS, public information, volunteer service, etc.

Fire departments by Federal Emergency Management Agency region

Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Regions V and IV accounted for 20% and 18% of the registered fire departments, respectively (Table 4).⁷ Regions IX and X accounted for about 4% each of the registered departments.
